President's Message



This year I logged 6,344 miles behind the wheel. That is a lot of Arizona highway, a lot of pre-dawn starts, and a lot of time thinking about the people we serve. Those miles are a reminder that service does not end when the uniform comes off. The same is true for MOAA.

MOAA National's flagship 2026 priority remains passage of the Major Richard Star Act (H.R. 2102 / S. 1032). Combat-injured veterans who were medically retired before 20 years of service still lose a dollar of earned military retired pay for every dollar of VA disability compensation. That "wounded veteran tax" is wrong. The bill already has overwhelming bipartisan support — nearly three-quarters of Congress has signed on — but it still must become law before this Congress adjourns.

Two companion priorities deserve our voice as well: the Shutdown Fairness Act that protects pay for currently serving members, including drill-status Guard and Reserve, during a funding lapse, and the GUARD VA Benefits Act that restores penalties on unaccredited "claim sharks" who prey on veterans. Please take two minutes this month and send a message through MOAA's Legislative Action Center at moaa.org. Constituent mail still moves votes.

Closer to home, the Luke Chapter Community Fund puts dollars directly into college scholarships for military-connected students and emergency grants that keep West Valley veterans housed and families fed. Recurring monthly gifts — even modest ones — give us the predictability to say "yes" when a veteran is days from eviction or a student needs tuition help. Every gift is tax-deductible through our 501(c)(3). Visit luke-fund.org to set up a monthly donation. Select "Assistance to Veterans" or "College Scholarships," or leave it unrestricted. Steady streams of donations serve as the engine for our veteran services, education/scholarship program, and our surviving spouses. Give what you can, I just did!

Luke Chapter Board Meeting September 3, 2026

Mike Kramer presided as chair. Mike warmly welcomed our new **NewsGram editor** Susan McDonell. She succeeds Scott Phillips, who stays on the Board as a director-at-large. Susan has extensive editorial experience. Welcome aboard, Susan. Scott, thank you for your long service!

Treasurer Jack Coate reported the current **asset balance** of Luke Chapter on August 31, 2026, is \$50,224. We have about \$25,000 in unrestricted equity.

Lt Gen John Regni submitted extensive reports to the Board on potential **Congressional and Arizona legislation** via email in July and August. Recently, Congress approved national appropriations through a continuing resolution until early December, bridging over mid-term elections in November.

The Board approved the draft **tax return**, IRS Form 990, for FY 2025-26. Mike Kramer will sign and file the return electronically.

Fifteen **college scholarships** totaling \$35,000 were awarded by Luke Chapter Community Fund at the annual awards ceremony in May. Grants ranged from \$2,000 to \$5,000. The first \$5,000 Captain Richard Miller Scholarship of was given to student Chloe Shannon.

The National MOAA Community Foundation **awarded the Luke Chapter a \$5,000 grant** to support our program of emergency financial assistance to veterans for housing, utilities, food, etc., and for the Turkeys-for-Troops food drive at Luke AFB.

RDML Craig Quigley, Director of Communications, Programs and Venues, discussed this year's plans for **luncheon and dinner meetings**. The first luncheon event will be in the Grand Room at Grandview Terrace, on October 17, 2026. Our speaker is Air Force Nurse, BG Winnie Fritz (Ret.).

Ben Hayes reported that Luke Chapter currently has **138 members**, including 105 regular members, 28 surviving spouses, and five "honorary" members; an increase of four members since spring. Ben leads our recruitment efforts will target 1,200 national MOAA members in the West Valley by emailing them copies of the *NewsGram* to spark interest in joining the Luke Chapter.

Linda Wolverton, SS Liaison, reported the activities of the **Surviving Spouses** in a written 'self-audit' and report to the Board. Linda is planning fun meetings and one field trip to an area of interest this year with the Surviving Spouse members.

Webmaster Bob Nelson asked the Board to update their areas of responsibility on the **Luke Chapter website** with photos and text.

Rev. Fannalou Guggisberg announced plans for the annual **canned food drive** to benefit active-duty members in need at Luke AFB in the Turkeys-for-Troops program.

Beth Johnson, Director of Retiree Activities Office at Luke AFB, reported on the details of the upcoming **Retiree Appreciation Day** on Saturday, September 26, 2026, at Luke AFB.

LEGISLATION UPDATE

GRACE (Granting Rollover Access and Contribution Extensions) for Military Survivors Act, (H.R. 9489)

When we lose our military spouse, we are dealing with family, household obligations, burial preparations, and grief. The current timeline for post-death monetary contributions to Roth IRAs and Educational Savings Account is one year for a final decision. It is simply too short. The GRACE bipartisan bill introduced June 25, 2026, would extend the time period from one year to three years for surviving spouses to contribute money received through military death gratuities and SGLI payments to Roth IRAs and Coverdell Education Savings Accounts without penalty.

**Introduced into congress
June 25, 2026**

The Love Lives On Act of 2025 (H.R. 1004 | S. 410)

This bill extends entitlement for various benefit programs and services for surviving spouses of deceased members of the Armed Forces or veterans. The bill provides that the remarriage of a surviving spouse must not bar the furnishing of dependency and indemnity compensation or special pension benefits to such spouse. Additionally, the Department of Defense may not terminate the payment of an annuity for a surviving spouse under the Survivor Benefit Plan solely because the surviving spouse remarries. The bill also expands the definition of a

dependent under TRICARE to include a remarried widow or widower whose subsequent marriage has ended due to death, divorce, or annulment.

**Forwarded by subcommittee to full Veterans Affairs Committee
March 26, 2026**

The Veteran Caregiver Reeducation, Reemployment, and Retirement Act (S. 879)

Focuses on caregivers who leave the workforce to support wounded, ill, or injured servicemembers, helping to protect their long-term financial and retirement security. The bill was referred February 20, 2026, to a subcommittee on Veterans Affairs who subsequently folded two bills speaking to the issue it into one, H.R.2148.

The more inclusive bill now would expand support for family caregivers of veterans by providing several key benefits/protections. The legislation extends medical care coverage for designated primary caregivers for 180 days after their designation is removed unless they are dismissed from the program for misconduct. The bill offers comprehensive employment assistance, including reimbursement of up to \$1,000 for certification or relicensure fees, free access to professional training modules, and connections to various employment support programs through the Departments of Defense, Labor, and Veterans Affairs. Additionally, the bill mandates expanded services for caregivers, such as retirement planning support, workforce transition assistance, and bereavement counseling.

The legislation also requires two important studies: one exploring the feasibility of a "returnship" program to help caregivers re-enter the workforce, and a second investigating potential employment opportunities for former caregivers within the Department of Veterans Affairs. Furthermore, the bill directs the Comptroller General to assess the VA's efforts.

WASHINGTON DC

COLA Watch

The July 2026 Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) was released August 12, at 327 which is 3.1% above the COLA baseline. Inflation fell back a bit so the predicted COLA for 2027 may be a tad lower than earlier thought. AARP predicts 3.5%; MOAA predicts 3.6%. We have two more months of data to add to the July number before we will know for sure. The August data will be released September 11.



Take Care of America's Veterans Act (TCAVA)

A once-in-a-generation bill that has upwards of 60 items for veterans and families is stalled in Congress. Despite working towards passage before the recess, the bill got wrapped up in other gridlock items. Some members of The Military Coalition—rather than accept some compromise to attain the larger good—balked at tinnitus and sleep apnea being removed from VA disability rating computations, as well as the "pay-go" costs of components like the Richard Star Act. Expect a debate in both chambers once they reconvene (House meets August 31 then breaks again for Labor Day; Senate meets September 14). Even if it passes, the President maintains he will not sign any bill into law until the Save America Act is on his desk.

Defense Bills

Since both chambers will not be in full session until September 14, that leaves a mere 13 working days before the end of the fiscal year. We will need passage of the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) and the Defense Appropriations Act by then, or yet another Continuing Resolution (CR), hopefully, through January when the new Congress is sworn in. On the NDAA, the House did its work before recess; the Senate failed. If the Senate passes its version, then a conference committee will form to build the final bill—not much time left. On the Defense Appropriations Act, the House Committee did its work, but no floor vote has been held; the Senate version has not cleared the committee.

Government Shutdown

If no Appropriations by midnight September 30, and if no CR, then another shutdown. The House passed a bill for continuing funding through December 4, the Senate December 11. They will have to conference to decide which works. Ideally, we will have Bills passed in September—though more likely not. However, a preferred Continuing Resolution would be through January and past the holidays so the air traffic controllers and TSA agents, and others are fully compensated for work over the Holidays.



Government Debt

We crossed a new milestone with the federal debt now over \$40 trillion. The interest payment on carrying that degree of debt is \$1.2 trillion a year, or \$3.2 billion every day. That equates to 15% of the entire federal budget serving the interest on the debt, with no output or services for those monies. When we look at the 'discretionary' portion of the federal budget—Defense, Education, Homeland Security, Transportation, and other federal agencies—interest now amounts to 52% of all discretionary spending.

LOCAL TO ARIZONA

Property Tax Exclusions

No new updates on the 2027 property tax exemption for 100% disabled veterans and those less than 100%. The Maricopa County Assessor's Office has not yet released the 2027 application form. The updated form will likely remain unavailable until the application window opens on Monday, January 4, 2027. Please note that the filing deadline is March 1, and late submissions are not accepted.

You do not want to be late!

If you have a VA service-connected disability rating, you might want to:

- Add a calendar suspense item to apply on January 4.
- Start collecting the required documents, such as your DD Form 214, the VA benefits letter showing your disability percentage, proof of county residence, and Form 82514V (released on or about January 4).
- Stay tuned for further updates.

Legislative Affairs Continued

November 2026 Election

Eight Propositions on the Arizona Ballot

Prop 141: Amends the Arizona Constitution to preemptively bar state and local governments from imposing taxes or fees on vehicles based on number of miles driven, or from monitoring or limiting mileage.

Prop 142: Amends the Arizona Constitution to expand a 2010 affirmative action ban by prohibiting diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) policies at the state and local level, including by giving preferential treatment based on race or ethnicity in hiring or academic admissions.

Prop 144: Amends the Arizona Constitution to require all voters, including those who vote by mail, to show valid government ID "before casting a ballot in each election." Axios' comment: "It's unclear how people who vote by mail would do that."

Prop 316: Caps municipalities' sales taxes on food at 2% and requires voters to approve any increases. Preexisting taxes above 2% can remain in place but are frozen.

Prop 317: Declare drug cartels as terrorist organizations under state law and direct the Arizona Department of Homeland Security "to do everything in its authority to address threats posed" by them.

Prop 318: Bar transgender athletes from using restrooms, locker rooms and showers used by teams from public and private schools and athletic associations if they do not correspond with the athletes' biological sex recorded on their birth certificates. Also strengthens preexisting bans on transgender athletes playing on single-sex sports teams that do not correspond with their biological sex.

Prop 319: Ban use of photo radar traffic enforcement by state and local governments. Anyone who already has a contract for photo radar cameras before the end of 2026 could only continue using them with voter approval.

Prop 320: Require school districts in Arizona's most populous counties, or districts with at least 7,500 students, to spend a minimum of 60% of their operating budgets on direct instructional expenses.

Helping Needy Vets

Luke Chapter Returns to Support Needy Veterans

In fiscal year 2017-18, Luke Chapter began a program to provide cash grants to veterans facing a financial emergency related to housing, utilities, transportation, food and other necessary living expenses. The program included our annual food collection drive under Rev. Fannalou Guggisberg's leadership supporting active-duty enlisted members in the "Turkeys-for-Troops" program at Luke AFB. That year we applied for one of only four grants being offered by the MOAA Community Foundation in its inaugural 'Community Outreach' grant program. We were selected among numerous other MOAA chapter applications for a maximum grant of \$6,250 for our initial veterans' program year.

It gets better – Luke Chapter has won a Community Outreach grant from MOAA's Community Foundation charity for each of the past ten years. To our knowledge, no other chapter has received an annual grant every year since inception. In addition, we have consistently secured the maximum funding amount awarded to any chapter. In May 2026, the Luke Chapter was once again awarded the maximum \$5,000 grant for our Veterans' Relief Grant Program for expenditure this program year. A special thank you goes to the Luke Chapter Community Fund members, who wrote our winning proposal last spring.

While the MOAA and local business grants are very important, our chapter members provide about 75% of the total funding we distribute each year. The success of the Luke Chapter Veterans' program truly depends on the generosity of our chapter members. In the past decade, our program has granted more than \$220,000 to about 140 individual veterans and their families for emergency housing and food assistance. This program year, we expect to have a total budget of roughly \$25,000 available to grant, most of which will come directly from our own generous members!

Finally, our chapter is already engaged in the annual canned and packaged food drive for the Turkeys-for-Troops program. We partner with the First Sergeant's Association at Luke AFB and the PebbleCreek Men's Nine-Hole Golf Club. We typically provide more than 1,000 food items annually to needy, enlisted members at Luke AFB. Last November, we also handed out about 125 \$50 commissary gift cards to individuals passing through the line.

Please bring unexpired food items to our first chapter luncheon on October 17, 2026, at Grandview Terrace. Social begins at 11:30 a.m.

Luke Chapter MOAA never stops helping our fellow active-duty service members, veterans, and their families to have a home, utilities, and sufficient food.

Winnie has held positions as a CEO, Chief Clinical Officer and/or Chief Nursing Officer in seven U.S. hospitals. She has worked as a clinician, leader, educator, and consultant in international healthcare organizations in 24 countries in Europe, the Middle East, Africa,

South America, and Asia. Her career as a healthcare professional began with her tenure as a nurse in the US Army. Winnie served in leadership positions in the U.S., Thailand, and Vietnam (where her commendations include the Bronze Star). In the military, she also earned her pilot's wings; she was selected to be the healthcare professional caring for Bob Hope on his annual Christmas Tour to troops in Vietnam and Thailand; and Winnie was manager of the presidential/VIP suites at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in D.C. caring for our President, congress, 3-,4- and 5-star generals, and foreign heads of state. It was in this unit she met and cared for the late King Hussein of Jordan.

Winnie was recruited by His Majesty King Hussein to move to Jordan; to assess the health status of the population, to lead curriculum development and serve as Dean of a School of Nursing, and later to serve as Quality & Operations Officer in a 28-hospital network. She worked in Jordan 17 years and still is there annually and keeps a home in the countryside with an olive grove. For her success, His Majesty awarded her his Medal of Honor.

She has served as an assistant professor at four U.S. universities teaching healthcare graduate students how to assess and enhance/"fix" our complex healthcare system. The U of MO has awarded Winnie their highest award – the Golden Quill Excellence Award – "as a global health leader who reflects responsibility, discovery, and excellence." The U of MD School of Nursing has awarded Winnie their highest award – The Visionary Pioneer Award – "transforming healthcare on a global scale." Recently, the national Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) awarded Winnie the inaugural Dr. Anita N. McGee Legacy Award, which notes: "The Army Nurse Corps was founded by Dr. McGee 125 years ago. Dr. Fritz represents the legacy that Dr. McGee envisioned for an Army Nurse's role and positive impact during military service and in a continuing service-oriented career here and abroad."

She serves on four U.S. healthcare-related boards. Her recent research is focused on Veterans' health needs and care systems; and, with hundreds of veterans, has developed and is working to enhance the model of care at the VA. Winnie has also spent hundreds of hours developing copyrighted tools and assessing continuing care retirement communities – working to enhance senior adults' quality of life and healthcare.

Currently, Winnie is the COO/Sr. V.P. of Operations and Clinical Services at Health Care Corporation of America (HCCA) Management Co. She works in healthcare organizations in the U.S., Middle East, and Africa: 1) to assess and improve health professionals' competencies; 2) to do site and space planning while building or renovating healthcare facilities; 3) to develop leaders' skills; and 4) to help health systems innovate, eliminate waste and provide better care at lower costs with improved clinical, satisfaction and financial outcomes.

William “Bill” Simon was born and raised in Phoenix and served 27 years in the U. S. Army Reserve and Air National Guard. He enlisted in 1970 after graduating from ASU with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Management and later earned his commission through the Arizona Officer Candidate School program in 1977. In his career, Bill served in Infantry, Transportation, Quartermaster, Ordnance and Medical Service units before retiring as a lieutenant colonel in 1997. He also completed the U. S. Army Command and General Staff College in 1990.

Outside of the military, Bill spent 40 years in banking, serving as vice president and branch manager for banks in Phoenix and Goodyear.

His record of community service spans numerous organizations, including Civitan in Globe, Kiwanis in Litchfield Park, Rotary in Buckeye, and the Litchfield Park Historical Society.

His veteran advocacy includes roles with the Luke Chapter MOAA, American Legion Post 61 in Avondale, and the Arizona America250 Commission.

Bill is widely known for his work preserving military history. He and his wife operate the 1st Lt. Frank Luke Jr. Memorial Museum and Research Center in Goodyear, dedicated to the Arizona World War I flying ace known as the “Arizona Balloon Buster.” Since opening in 2014, the museum and Bill’s “Desert Warriors” display team have provided educational outreach to hundreds of students and adults across the Valley.

In 2025, Bill was selected for induction into The Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame, established in 2001 by Unified Arizona Veterans to honor those who continue to make significant contributions after their military service.

Bill’s philosophy: “Good solid leadership is imperative, and solid logistics is essential to success. Your ability to properly “read” folks you work with will greatly aid your success.”

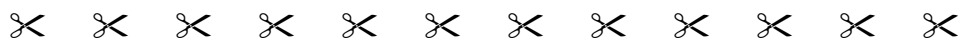

SUPPORT VETERANS

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THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

Oct. 4, 1582 - The Gregorian Calendar took effect in Catholic countries as Pope Gregory XIII issued a decree stating the day following Thursday, October 4 would be Friday, October 15, 1582, correcting a 10-day error accumulated by the Julian Calendar. Britain and the American colonies adopted the Gregorian Calendar in 1752.

Oct. 21, 1879 - Thomas Edison successfully tested an electric incandescent lamp with a carbonized filament at his laboratory in Menlo Park, New Jersey keeping it lit for over 13 hours.

Oct. 26, 1881 - The shoot-out at the O.K. Corral in Tombstone, Arizona occurred between the feuding Clanton and Earp families.

Oct. 13, 1884 - Greenwich was established as the universal time from which standard time throughout the world are calculated.
